




They toured Britain and Europe together and after her husband's death in 1781 she spent much time with him. In 1784 she married an Italian musician, Gabriel Piozzi, provoking from Johnson "...a letter of unjustifiable fury..." (ODNB). "Several of Johnson's verses were first printed in this volume" (Courtney). First published in the same year.







Joseph Goodall (1760-1840) was a renowned amateur naturalist with a particular interest in conchology. This copy bears his extensive, neat and erudite annotations to the margins of both text and plates, passing comment in English and French and referencing contemporary works by continental naturalists such as Lamarck, Lamour and Pallas. On his demise, Goodall's collection was sold by the auctioneer Stevens of Covent Garden for which "A Catalogue of the Exceedingly Choice and Select Collection of Shells: Belonging to the Rev. Joseph Goodall" was produced. The sale was held over four days in early June 1840, showing the scale of the collection. The Hooker ownership inscription continues by stating this copy was purchased at that sale. The signature is not that of Joseph Dalton Hooker, who was naturalist aboard James Clark Ross' expedition to the Antarctic from 1839-1843, but rather that of his father William Jackson Hooker, the equally celebrated naturalist and director of the Botanical Gardens at Kew from 1841. It is easy to imagine that Hooker senior would have taken a keen interest in the sale of such a monumental collection and in signing it in his son's name he was either indicating that he was buying it on his behalf or as a gift for him.

For centuries the burgeoning global trade had prompted investigations into the practicalities of a route over land or by water across the Isthmus of Panama, the shortest land bridge between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. Gisborne had undertaken various large civil engineering projects in Great Britain and Ireland in the 1840s and was commissioned to travel to Panama to look into the feasibility of building a ship canal in the early 1850s. Though this expedition met with little success, he was able to produce a book - "The Isthmus of Darien in 1852..." - and these maps. He took part in a better prepared and supported expedition in 1854 and the conclusion of those researches deemed that the construction of a navigable canal was entirely impractical. The building of the Panama Railway was completed soon after and in the 1880s the French - emboldened by the success of their construction of the Suez Canal - endeavoured to resurrect the concept of the ship canal. Beset by the sheer physical hardship of building such a monumental work in such an inhospitable environment the French enterprise failed. The work was subsequently completed by the U.S. in the early 20th century and the Panama Canal finally opened in 1914.
